Last summer, in the course of my work,
I had occasion to make a partial examination
of the Stikine or Stikine River, in western B.C.,
with Mr. McCawell of my staff, & made a survey
of the river to Selkirk Creek. As I am now
reporting on the work, & understand that you
have published various observations made on
the Stikine, I take the liberty of writing to ask
whether you will be so good as to give your
references to such publications. In little has
been done on the river hitherto & it is
desirable to compile all previous work.

Dear Sir:

In the year 1879 I spent a few weeks on the Stickeen River, but most of my notes are still unpublished. I explored in a very imperfect way some of the larger glaciers flowing into the main canyon. Only a few letters published in the San Francisco Bulletin, written in a popular style and not likely to prove of much interest to you in the work you are engaged upon. I have seen nothing of the upper main affluents of the river save what came in my way in [my] journey to the Cassiar(?) gold mines on the upper Mackenzie.
