## Classes Cancelled

# S.E. Asia Teach-In Today

The University of the Pacific will participate in the national teach-in called for today. The university has endorsed the teach-in by cancelling all classes for today.

Activities were organized Sunday evening at a special rally. It was decided then that students interested in participating in the national protest against the United States invasion of Cambodia would organize activities for UOP.

At the rally, Dr. Larry Meredith reported on a phone call he had made to Carl Oglesby, former national president of SDS. Meredith said that Oglesby expressed great concern for what had happened in the last few days in Southeast Asia. He went on to report that the former national student leader said that it would not be effective if students merely threw a tantrum.

Meredith made it clear that we must get something together in opposition to what is happening to this country. He said "we can't let ourselves go down the drain of history."

Academic Vice President Dr. John Bevan also spoke at the rally. He emphasized that the students interested in protesting the US involvement in Southeast Asia should know who their enemy is.

Bevan made it clear that destroying this university would not accomplish anything. He expressed his own concern for this country's recent activities.
