EXAMINATION AT THE INSTITUTE

BY HARRY.

(Editor's note:—The following is taken from the Literary Casket which is probably the first publication ever issued by students of the University of the Pacific. This article was written in 1860 by a young fellow known to us only as "Harry." The spelling and punctuation have been retained.)

Well Mr. Editor, since the last number of your valueable paper was read, many important events have occurd. The first season of this year has ended, and we have passed through another examination. In the male department it was less interesting than on former occations, we presume the cause of this, was the cold weather and scarcity of ladies. You will remember that the examination was going on in the both departments at the same time, and therefore that circle of smiling visitors whose presence was wont to cheer us in other days, could not attend but once or twice. But at the Institute they were more fortunate: for they had the pleasure of seeing a large number of fine looking fellows from the brick building. I have no doubt they felt them selves highly honered; for they gave us the greatest squeezeing that we ever had in our lives. After the room was so crowded that a piec of the human family the size of a Chinese baby could not have got in, and I was so nearly *kilt* that I thought of singing out blue murder; the gentleman who has the pleasure of presiding over that body of intelligent fair dames, arose and with characteristic coolness said, gentlemen sit as compactly as you can: The request discouraged me and I was about to will what few effects I owned to the University and bid adieu to single missery, but just at that eventfull moment one of the young ladies began to sing a most delightful song and I suppose I must have caught an air of music or some other kind of an air for I soon revived and was prepared to listen to the next thing on the program, which was the examination of a large class of girls, or a class of large girls, just as you please, judging from their appearance, their ages must have been all the way from sweet 16 to 20. The paper the singing and the music by the piano-forte added much to the interest of the occation and on the whole it was one of the most pleasant examinations ever held in that room. . . .
