My dear Mrs. Davis -  
With the present issue  
of the College bills I find  
that I must ask you  
for the second \$250.<sup>00</sup>  
of the five hundred  
you are so good as  
to lend to me.  
I enclose a note made  
out for the amount.

But I have, as you see  
left the rate of  
interest blank, as,  
through an oversight  
Mr. Trimming has  
not told me of the  
interest rate on the  
first \$250.

In sending the money  
I shall be obliged if  
you will deduct  
the amount of the

interest for one year  
on the first note -  
as that seems the  
simplest method of  
paying it. I have  
left the date, - as  
15 day of the month  
blank, in this note, -  
which should be dated  
on the day the money  
is sent to me.  
The College bill read to  
be paid before Feb. 21<sup>st</sup>.
