We received your letter and two postal cards on the twenty ninth, and it did us all good to hear from you again. But I myself have received no letter since you left the Wash. mountains. You have never told us yet whether you have received our letters.

We are all well here, except that we have colds. Aunt Margaret was about as usual



when we saw her last.  
Mr. and Mrs. Neelake are still  
at the Sanitarium in Oakland.  
Mr. Neelake seems a little  
better just now, but there is  
no hope and he is slowly  
growing weaker every day.

The weather here is beautiful  
now, but winter will soon be  
here. The grapes are at  
their best and every one is  
busy shipping them. A  
good many are sent from  
Muir Station every day.

Nauck is hard at work at  
College, and I with High School.  
He had a delightful visit  
with the Merriams two weeks  
ago, but they only stayed one  
day. The Doctor had some  
beautiful pictures which he  
showed us. The Gannetts  
returned from the Philippines  
about three weeks ago, and  
hurried home to Washington  
so we did not see them.  
Dr. Merriam said Dr. Gannett  
was much pleased with the  
Philippine Islands.
