Portage Wis Xmas Night 1902

Dear Brother, John,

Dear Brother, I have decided to send you the old Family Bible containing the Family Record. Much of which is written by father + Mother themselves. It includes the Grandchildren names also - nearly all of them.

Go down to the express office + attend to it.
