I have been reading over
the M.S. of my autobiography
making corrections and a few
changes. Years ago in reply
to publishers letters I promised
to allow several of the best
publishers to read it before
signing any contract.
I now regret having placed
myself under these obligations,
for I think that an author
should select his publisher
on more general grounds than
a slight difference in royalty.
I have not mentioned your
proposed terms however to any
other publisher.

Mr Scaife told me as I was leaving Boston that your proposal was to pay me a royalty of fifteen per cent. on the retail price, increasing to twenty after the sale of ten thousand copies. I can't accept the ten thousand copies clause. But if you will change the terms to twenty per cent on all copies sold I shall send you a corrected copy of the M.S. and sign the contract without further delay. Anyhow, whatever
